

2025-2026 CHERISH Pilot Grant Funding Opportunity

About CHERISH

The Center for Health Economics of Treatment Interventions for Substance Use Disorders, HCV, and HIV (CHERISH) is a multi-institutional Center of Excellence funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA). The Center's mission is to develop and disseminate health economic research on healthcare utilization, health outcomes, and health-related behaviors that informs substance use disorder treatment policy and HCV and HIV care of people who use substances. The Center is a collaboration among Weill Cornell Medicine, Boston Medical Center, Boston University School of Public Health, University of Pennsylvania, and University of Miami Miller School of Medicine.

CHERISH Pilot Grants – Special Topics of Interest

CHERISH seeks to fund health economic research projects on healthcare utilization, health outcomes, and health-related behaviors consistent with our mission.

In this cycle, we particularly encourage health economic research proposals relating to one or more of the following special topics of interest, but we will consider proposals on other topics that are also consistent with our mission:

- Challenges and opportunities in delivering overdose prevention and harm reduction services, substance use care, and/or HIV/HCV care of people who use substances to people who live in rural communities
- Providing long-acting injectable medications for HIV prevention, HIV treatment, and/or opioid use disorder treatment

Examples of research on these special topics of interest include the following, but we encourage applicants to propose additional research areas:

- Collecting pilot data for economic evaluation studies of strategies that address barriers to treatment uptake in rural communities (e.g. medical transportation, telehealth, mobile units) or overdose prevention (e.g., community-wide trainings on recognizing the signs of overdose and administering naloxone, overdose prevention lifeline such as Never Use Alone hotline, etc.)
- Determining the cost of culturally adapted substance use interventions in rural areas (e.g. overdose prevention for American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) populations
- Using claims data to investigate the implications of COVID-19 pandemic on medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD) regulatory changes for MOUD treatment initiation and retention in rural communities
- Developing tools to evaluate financing alternatives for long-acting HIV treatment medications for people who are actively using drugs (e.g., 340b program, AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP), etc.)
- Using simulation modeling to explore the cost-effectiveness of long-acting MOUD as a bridge to substance use disorder treatment after release from carceral settings

Eligibility

Applicants can be located at any US-based institution; however, they must fulfill at least one of the following criteria:

- Postdoctoral fellow or trainee under the mentorship of a <u>CHERISH investigator</u>, <u>CHERISH</u> <u>Research Affiliate</u>, or <u>CHERISH advisory board member</u>
- An investigator nominated by a CHERISH investigator, CHERISH Research Affiliate, or CHERISH advisory board member
- A CHERISH investigator, CHERISH Research Affiliate, or CHERISH advisory board member

Priority consideration will be given to:

- <u>New or early stage investigators</u> as defined by NIH
- Investigators who are from underrepresented populations as defined by NIH
- Investigators new to the field of health economics or substance use disorders

I. Letter of Intent Submission

<u>Fill out this form to submit a Letter of Intent (LOI)</u> no later than Friday, January 10, 2025, to allow time to evaluate the relevance of the topic to the CHERISH mission and to identify appropriate reviewers. The LOI asks for basic information about the applicant as well as an overview of the proposed pilot project and team.

II. Proposal Submission – Required Format

Email the full pilot grant proposal to <u>pilot.grants@cherishresearch.org</u> by Friday, February 21, 2025. Include the following 14 sections detailed below:

8. Budget	The target range for each award will be \$10,000 to \$20,000 in total costs. We recommend that indirect cost be waived by the applicant's institution given the limited availability of funds. Submit a breakdown of cost using the supplemental spreadsheet template. 9. Budget Justification	Provide brief justification of each line item in the accompanying budget. Please describe other funding, awarded or pending, available for the proposed project that will supplement the funds being requested. Effort levels here must match the budget; if a person is offering their time in-kind, list that individual on the budget at 0 calendar months (salary info may be left blank). 14. Letter(s) of Support	For eligible postdoctoral fellows and trainees, please include a letter from your mentor that details the support the mentor will provide during the project period. Letters of Support from other collaborators are optional but encouraged.

III. Proposal Review - Our Process

The CHERISH Pilot Grant, Training & Mentoring Core will select reviewers with expertise related to pilot project proposals. Reviewers will include CHERISH advisory board members, CHERISH leadership and investigators, CHERISH Research Affiliates, and/or relevant experts identified by these individuals.

Review criteria and the associated scoring system are similar to those employed by the NIH. Pilot project applications will be evaluated on the following criteria:

- Significance
- Investigator (includes consideration of the PI's biographical sketch and career plan)
- Innovation
- Approach
- Environment (review of this criterion will include consideration of the mentor's letter of support for postdoctoral fellows and trainees)

Applicants will receive written feedback from reviewers on the strengths and weaknesses of their proposal on each of the above-mentioned criteria, as well as Human Subjects and Budget sections. In addition, reviewers will provide feedback to applicants on strategies for external funding beyond the proposed pilot grant and ways to improve the research proposed to increase the likelihood of obtaining this external funding.

IV. Funds Awarded – Pilot Grant Activities

Funded investigators will receive support and guidance from the Pilot Grant, Training & Mentoring Core and CHERISH leadership. Support includes access to training activities, consultation with the Dissemination & Policy Core, and opportunities to connect with additional mentors.

Pilot grant recipients are expected to present their preliminary results and future plans to CHERISH leadership in-person and/or virtually at least once during the grant period.

Principal Investigators of the pilot project grants are required to meet quarterly with the Pilot Grant, Training & Mentoring Core leadership and staff.
